He is currently held in Bangkok remand prison and authorities are denying his right to bail.

### **Cathedral Notices**

We have had **an outstanding response to September's Giving Campaign** from across our congregations! In summary:

- •16 people have become regular donors to the Cathedral for the first time;
- •35 existing donors have transferred their giving from Standing Order to the more efficient Parish Giving Scheme;
- •18 existing donors have increased their level of giving.

It is still a little early to assess the impact of the campaign on overall levels of giving but the effect will clearly be positive. Thank you to everyone who has got involved. If you have yet to do so or would like further information, please go to 'Regular Giving' under the 'More' tab of our website. Canon Kenneth's sermon from 17th September about Christian giving and the Cathedral's budget is on our Youtube channel, and Kenneth and Development Manager Jilly Wright would love to hear from you if you have questions about this important part of our life together.

This year's **Advent and Christmas art installation** is part of a wider body of work by Shezad Dawood called *Leviathan*. The title comes from the biblical sea monster which Wiltshire-born philosopher Thomas Hobbes later used to describe the state. The exhibition invites reflection on issues faced by the world, in particular climate change and migration. It resonates with this season as a reminder that Jesus was born into the messiness of the real world, not a Christmas of superficial tinsel. **Liturgical Furniture.** You may remember that earlier this year we trialled mock-ups of new liturgical furniture for the Spire Crossing and Trinity Chapel. We appreciated the questionnaire responses that we received from the congregation, volunteers and staff at the time. In the last week we have been delighted to receive the new altars, daises and clergy chairs, which are now in the Cathedral and are now in use. They will be consecrated by Bishop Stephen at a service in January, of which details will follow in due course. **Bach Cantata Evensong.** On Sunday 17 December at 4.30pm Evensong will include J S Bach's Cantata BWV 140 Wachet auf, ruft uns die Stimme performed by the Cathedral Choir, soloists and period instruments. Based on the hymn Wachet auf by Philipp Nicolai, this cantata was first performed in 1731 and is often performed during Advent. All are welcome to attend.

**An Introduction to the Gospel of Mark.** Tues 23 Jan 2024, 7.30–8.45pm in Sarum College. (This is a re-rerun for those unable to get seats at the November session.) Led by Canon Treasurer Kenneth Padley. Mark's gospel, from which most Sunday morning gospel readings will be taken in 2024, is the earliest life of Jesus and so vital to our understanding of his life and mission.
