January Prisoner of Conscience: Ana da Silva Miguel (also known as Neth Nahara), was arrested in Luanda, Angola. On 14 August she was convicted to 6 months in prison for recording a live video on TikTok criticising the president. Following an appeal by the public prosecutor in September, her sentence was increased to 2 years in prison. Since her arrest, Nahara has been denied access to her daily medication and in December was hospitalised due to her deteriorating health. Her conviction and sentence stem from the peaceful exercise of her right to freedom of expression. Neth Nahara must be immediately released.

Like most organisations the Church uses acronyms, which sometimes are helpful and at other times are not – I am sure this may be true of 'LPA' which stands for Lay Pastoral Assistants. Many benefices have them and we have two at the Cathedral Caro Waldman and Sylvia Roseaman. Their role is to assist the clergy in the carrying out of their Pastoral Responsibilities and they are used in different and various ways. Our two LPAs help with visiting and taking Home Communion. It is hoped to add to their number, so as a first step, two Information Sessions have been arranged both taking place at Sarum College on Wed 31 Jan at 2.30pm and on Thurs 1 Feb at 6.30pm. If you might be interested in becoming more involved in the Pastoral Work of the church and this Cathedral, then please come along one of these meetings to learn more.

Edward Burne-Jones: Windows to the Soul Talk. Thurs 1 Feb, 7pm, in the North Transept. Our 19th Century stained-glass window in the South Quire Aisle, designed by eminent Pre-Raphaelites, Sir Edward Burne-Jones and William Morris, needs vital work to restore it to its original beauty. In this talk, **Nicholas Tromans**, who has worked in universities, museums, and auction houses, is an expert in 19thC British art and will introduce this important conservation project. He is the author of books and articles on artists including Richard Dadd, G. F. Watts, and William Holman Hunt. He was a contributor to the catalogue of Tate Britain's 2018 Burne-Jones exhibition.
