
England's finest medieval Cathedral inspires millions of people at home and abroad with its extraordinary beauty, reflecting God's love, power and presence on earth. It exemplifies the best of British craftsmanship, which our own craftspeople continue here today.

The Cathedral uplifts with its tradition of sung worship, which sees some of the nation's most gifted young musicians singing the most sublime choral music every day. And it brings hope all over

the world with its commitment to human rights, which began with the sealing of the Magna Carta in 1215 and continues with the Cathedral's work for prisoners of conscience.

• Salisbury Cathedral attracts 250,000 visitors a year, but it is not just a historical monument: it is a living local church and a place of prayer. Its legacy for future generations is priceless – but it comes at a cost. The Cathedral costs £14,000 per day to run – and we receive no funding from the Government or the Church of England towards this important work.

Salisbury Cathedral has so much to offer future generations. Here are just a few of the things your legacy could help us conserve for the future...



••• A sublime choral tradition

Music lies at the heart of the Cathedral's worship. Choristers have been singing sacred music to a professional standard at Salisbury for 1,000 years.

In 1991, Salisbury made history by setting up the first girls' cathedral choir on an equal basis to the boys'. As well as singing at Evensong and Sunday services, both choirs delight music-lovers with BBC broadcasts, CD recordings and concerts. To ensure no talented child is excluded through lack of finances, we help fund choristers' education at Salisbury Cathedral School with bursaries – but this presents a financial challenge.

“Cathedral music is better than it has ever been,” says Director of Music David Halls. “But it is a fragile tradition, because it is so expensive to maintain.”

••• The best of British craftsmanship

From the tranquility of the cloisters to the ancient wood scaffolding within the spire, it is impossible not to be awed by the sheer beauty of Salisbury Cathedral and the extraordinary craftsmanship behind it.

We take our role as custodians of England's finest Early English Gothic Cathedral very seriously: Salisbury has its own Works Department, which preserves rare skills and keeps them alive through apprenticeships. All year round, our own specialist stonemasons, sawyers, conservators and glaziers work hard to conserve and maintain our historic buildings.

But the ongoing need for urgent repair work to the fabric of the building means our finances are stretched to the limit.

••• A legacy of learning

Salisbury Cathedral has always been a place of learning. Today, our Education Centre hosts activities for local children, young people and families. These range from our Master Builder workshop, which helps children discover how the Cathedral was constructed, to specialist workshops for local children with learning difficulties and disabilities.

••• A heritage of liberty

In the Cathedral Chapter House lies a cornerstone of liberty: the original Magna Carta document sealed by King John in 1215, the finest of only four that survive today.

Effectively the first human rights declaration, it still influences codes of law around the world. And that commitment to social justice lives on at Salisbury – from our 40 year partnership with the Episcopal Church of Sudan, supporting communities through civil war, to our links with Amnesty International. In the Trinity Chapel, the Amnesty candle burns continuously as pilgrims join our daily prayers for a prisoner of conscience.

Your legacy...

Back in the 13th century, the building of Salisbury Cathedral was only possible because of donations: gifts of money from local clergy; and of stone, from the Teffont Evias Quarry. Today, only donations will keep it alive for future generations to enjoy.

So if you value our Cathedral, and all it represents, please consider making a bequest in your Will. You can choose to help maintain the fabric of the building, or to support our music, liturgy, education or all of our Christian work.


Any bequest to the Cathedral is 100% exempt from Inheritance Tax, which means all your money goes to support our work here and now; anyone leaving 10% of their taxable estate to charity will qualify for a reduced rate of inheritance tax. This means your family won't have to pay as much tax to the Government, as inheritance tax will be reduced to 36% instead of the normal rate of 40%.

We would be happy to answer any questions you may have, although we recommend that you use a solicitor when making your bequest.

If you remember the Cathedral in your Will, your name will appear in our Book of Remembrance, displayed in the Cathedral as a permanent tribute to all our benefactors.
